THE GETTYSBURG FESTIVAL RETURNS in June with another extraordinary line-up of world-class artists and performers in a variety of free and ticketed venues throughout town. The 10-day festival showcases traditional as well as modern talent in 100 events celebrating American creativity in Music, Theater and Cabaret, Visual Art, Film, Dance, Culinary Arts and Children's Programming. Headliners include legendary jazz pianist Ahmad Jamal, innovative modern dance troupe Philadanco, and the River City Brass, known as "the Boston Pops—in Brass!"

The Arts Council is a proud Festival partner and will open this massive arts celebration with a free Community Children's Arts Fair on Thursday, June 18, 4 to 7 p.m. at the Festival Main Stage lawn, beside Penn Hall on the Gettysburg College campus. Children will delight in hands-on activities like a Kid's Jug Band with Tom Jolin (*left*), interactive theater with Ann Griffith (*above left*), and balloon sculpture and jewelry by Adventure in Fun. Design a clock with Tony Messano, make decorative boxes with Melissa Jackson, construct a pinwheel with Kim Robinson, or etch a mirror with Marie Smith! Prestidigitator Marc Charisse will teach sleight of hand illusions to budding magicians. To get ready for the Festival's children's theater shows, kids will make wands and crowns, get in character with face painting, and enjoy strolling players from the Adams County School of Musical Theatre and the ACTS of Kindness Theatre Company. Photographer Bert Danielson will be on hand to take photos of your child with Elmo. Gettysburg Festival Children's Programming is being presented by the *Evening Sun*.

On Friday, June 19, we invite you to the opening reception, 5 to 7 p.m. with awards ceremony at 6 p.m., for our sixth annual Juried

Art Exhibition through July 11 at Schmucker Art Gallery, Gettysburg College. According to Executive Director Chris Glatfelter, "Through our partnership with Schmucker Gallery Director Shannon Egan, the Gettysburg Festival, and our sponsors, we're delighted to present area artists to a wider audience and offer significant prizes recognizing their accomplishments."

Exhibition awards are \$1,000 Best of Show, sponsored by Scott & Company Fine Jewelers; \$750 Second Prize sponsored by RE/MAX of Gettysburg agents Suzanne Christianson, Karen Falk, Linda Kane-Taylor, and Barb Zimmerman; \$500 Third Prize sponsored by Debra McCauslin, For the Cause Productions. Schmucker Art Gallery sponsors the \$100 Director's Award.


Juror for the 2009 event is Dr. J. Susan Isaacs, Professor of Art History and Curator of the Holtzman MFA Gallery at Towson University and Adjunct Curator of the Delaware Center for the Contemporary Arts.

Imagine a place . . .

AT OUR ANNUAL MEETING, I unveiled the goals our board established in its new five-year strategic plan. Here's some background on how we arrived at these objectives.

After an exhaustive two-year process, we received certification in the Pennsylvania Association of Nonprofit Organizations' Standards for Excellence program. The Seal of Excellence we now proudly display demonstrates that your Arts Council complies with 56 specific standards in areas like integrity, transparency, and accountability. When you donate money to the Arts Council, you can be sure that we follow best practices in management, fundraising, and fiscal policies.

Realizing during this process that we needed to update our strategic plan, we hired consultant Kayte Connelly to help us. We asked the community to identify needs for arts and culture in Adams County. More than 80 people accepted our invitation and attended our "Big Canvass" meetings. After those lively discussions, Ms. Connelly helped the board assimilate community response and incorporate it into the new document.

In the new plan our board establishes goals, timelines, and measures of success for expanding our facilities, increasing program offerings, creating partnerships, developing the board, building a diversified financial portfolio, growing our membership, and nurturing a professional staff.

The primary need identified during the Big Canvass was for a **multi-function community arts education center**. The board is exploring how to find and fund the space that our community wants. Creating such a facility is a bold undertaking, particularly in today's economy. But we cannot allow fear of the current situation to derail our dreams . . . especially when we've been laying careful groundwork for the past 15 years.

To become a reality, a community center of this scope will require the minds and hands of many. *Think about what we could do at such a facility.* Envision a space with arts opportunities for children and adults *far* greater than our current facility allows. Picture a venue in which artists can not only grow and network, but also show and sell their art. Imagine an engine that creates jobs and supplements incomes. Think of a place where our community can come together for cultural enrichment, educational opportunities, and special events.

Please let me know how you might be able to help with this effort. As ever, your support is crucial to our success. And thank you again for your membership in the Arts Council.

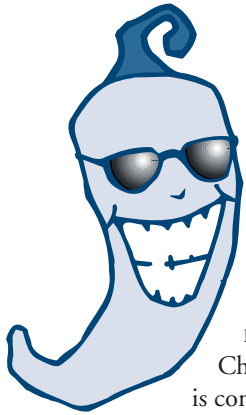

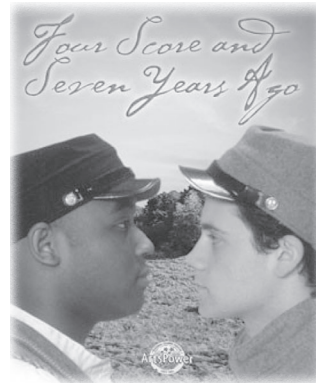

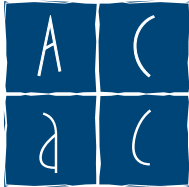
