General Rules:

See General Fair Rules and Regulations.

- 1. Competition is open to amateurs in all divisions. All entries will be judged Tuesday morning, August 21, 2012. All exhibits must be grown by exhibitor, except in arrangement classes. Violation of rules will result in forfeit of premium. Youth exhibits should be grown or arranged by youth.
- 2. Competition is divided into two sections: Seniors, 18 years and older, Youth, 17 and under.
- 3. Flowers and plants entered for competition must be of more than ordinary standard and quality to be entitled to an award.
- Entries for all classes will be accepted on Sunday August 19, 2012 from 2-4 p.m. and Monday, August 20, 2012 from 4-8 p.m. or the General Entries Registration Form may be used if mailed by August 1. The General Entries form can be found at the back of this book or on the web site at <u>www.southmountainfair.com</u>. An exhibitor may show only one entry per class.
- 5. Potted plants should have been growing in containers for two (2) months. All pots should be clean, with no foil, plastic support or other embellishments. Exhibitor's name should be on underside of pots. Plant sprays are not permitted.
- 6. Plants or specimens with obvious disease or insect infestations will not be accepted. Plants that bloom for one day, such as daylily or hibiscus, should not be entered.
- 7. The common name for all entries must be provided. List botanical name or variety if known.
- 8. Cut flowers are judged on both flowers and foliage which should be above the water line. Entries must be displayed in containers provided.
- 9. Only fresh or dried plant material may be shown. No artificial flowers of any kind such as silk, plastic, fabric or etc., may be used.
- 10. While care will be taken to avoid damaging an exhibit, Fair officials are not responsible for any damage or breakage, as well as the return of exhibits.
- 11. If the South Mountain Fair Association believes any of the exhibits were shown in previous years, those entries may be refused.
- 12. The South Mountain Fair Association reserves the right to combine listed classes, depending on the number of entries.
- 13. Exhibits will be released to exhibitors on Sunday, August 26, 2012 from 2:00-4:00 p.m. No prize money will be awarded for exhibits removed in violation of this rule. There are no exceptions.
- 14. Best of Show will be awarded only where justified by outstanding quality.
- 15. Department 17 reserves the right to remove and destroy any perishable exhibits which become unworthy of display.
- 16. Adults should not enter horticulture as youth grown. When possible youth should be present at registration.

TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL SHOWING

Pick flowers for exhibit either early in the morning or late in the afternoon. Place them in a container of tepid water. Cut a few more than needed, in case of accidents. Cut stems long. The stem and foliage should be in pleasing proportion to the flower. Blooms should be without signs of disease or insect damage. Know the name of what you are showing!

The following factors are important in the judging process:

1. Proper plant names.

- 6. Balance & symmetry.
- 2. Bloom quality, freshness, and uniformity.
- 7. Consistency of size/color.
- 8. No foliage below water line.

- Insect or disease damage.
 Overall appeal.
- 5. Compliance with class.

Adequate foliage above water line.
 Multiple blooms should be the same color.

General Rules:

- 1. This section includes all plants that would qualify as houseplants.
- 2. There should be only one species per pot except in collection classes.
- 3. Pots may not exceed 10" inside diameter.
- 4. Since display space is limited, no hanging plants. Potted plants will be exhibited on risers.
- 5. Potted plants which have won blue ribbons in previous years are not eligible for another ribbon.

Section 7 - Fresh Plant Materials, Senior

General Rules:

All classes have size limitations. Please adhere to the dimensions. Space is limited and oversized entries will be disqualified. Accessories are permitted but plant material must be dominate.

Hints for successful arrangements:

1. Use foliage with different colors, shapes and textures for greater interest. Strip off all leaves that will be under water.

- 2. Do not scatter colors, keep them grouped. Do not use colors in equal amounts.
- 3. Do not put largest flowers at the top, even though they are the prettiest and have the longest stems. Keep buds and small blooms at the top and sides, the largest and brightest should be at the center of interest.
- 4. Fresh flowers and fresh materials should be in the very best condition.
- 5. Avoid having more than one focal point on the same side. Do not push your focal point in, or let it hide under taller material above it.

Section 7 - Fresh Plant Materials, Senior

Class

- 1 Fresh arrangement using flowers **and** fruit or vegetables.
- 2 Fresh arrangement using coleus not to exceed 15" in width or depth.
- 3 Fresh arrangement in a teacup or coffee cup, not to exceed 10" in height.
- 4 Fresh miniature arrangement, not to exceed 5" in diameter, including container.
- 5 Fresh arrangement using flowers all of the same color.
- 6 Fresh arrangement using a pedestal container.
- 7 Fresh arrangement utilizing Adams County apples, not to exceed 18" in depth or width.

General Rules:

- 4. All of the following classes are open to both age groups.
